

## ASF prevention and early detection eLearning course

## What is it?

The African swine fever (ASF) prevention and early detection course is a new on-line course designed to help learners understand what they can do to protect our agricultural industries and communities from ASF.

The course uses images, videos and interactive scenario-based activities to provide a detailed and engaging picture of the potential impacts of ASF, how to prevent its introduction and establishment, and how to recognise and report the signs of ASF to ensure early detection if the disease does make through Australia's defences.

The course includes three modules and should take approximately 1½ hours to complete.

## Who is it for?

Queensland Governmen

Australia is free from ASF - and everyone can play a part in keeping it that way!

This course is particularly relevant to anyone who owns, interacts with, or observes domestic or feral pigs as part of their work or recreational activities. This includes:

- ✓ people who keep pigs, including commercial operators, small holders and pet pig owners
- anyone from the pork production, meat processing or animal transport industries
- ✓ vets, vet nurses and students
- ✓ agricultural advisers and service providers
- ✓ feral pig managers, hunters or harvesters
- Iandholders and state and local government officers who may observe feral pigs on lands they manage.

## How can I access the course?

This free course can be accessed through the Animal Health Australia (AHA) eLearning platform.

The course works best if you use a device with a larger screen, such as a desktop computer, laptop or tablet. Use of smartphones is possible, but not advised as readability and some functionality is affected.


